Sight loss news

Robin Christopherson MBE speaks at the House of Commons

On Wednesday 31st January Robin Christopherson MBE, Head of Digital Inclusion at AbilityNet, was asked to give evidence to a House of Commons select committee about how digital technology can help reduce barriers in the workplace for people with disabilities.

Robin, who is blind, is a great example of someone who uses technology to lead a busy professional life that takes him all around the world. He is also a brilliant advocate for the ways in which digital technology can help people of all abilities to achieve their goals. Robin addressed a panel of fifteen MPs and shared his knowledge as an IT expert.

First-ever 'guide horse' trained to help blind journalist

Britain's first-ever guide horse has been given to a blind journalist as campaigners battle for the animals to be allowed on planes and in restaurants.

Digby, an American miniature horse, is being trained as an assistance animal for Mohammed Salim Patel, 23, a journalist for the BBC, who is visually impaired and afraid of dogs.

Digby's owner Katy Smith is pushing for greater rights for those who rely on the horses as an alternative to the more traditional guide dogs. The horses are common in the United States but Digby is believed to be the first in training to work as an assistance animal in the UK.

Its latest report, Turned Out 2017, reveals that only one in four blind and partially sighted voters felt the current system let them vote independently and in secret.
