### **Update from Neil Newton, our Tech Mate Project Leader**

Hello! It's almost three months since the Tech Mate project started and already I have been able to provide help and assistance to many of our members with their technology queries. Whilst everyone has their own particular requirements and interests, I've seen lots of queries about screen magnification, screen reader software and voice commands. We have also had a lot of interest in the Microsoft Seeing AI app. This is a free app for Apple iPhones and iPads which reads text and documents out loud.

We have a dedicated computer in the office which we use to demonstrate JAWS, Dolphin SuperNova Magnifier & Screen Reader, and Dolphin

Guide screen reader software. We also have a Synapptic tablet to demonstrate their popular touch screen and speech output software.

With Christmas just around the corner, computers, smart phones and tablets are a useful way for people to keep in touch with friends and family across the world using applications like Skype and FaceTime. Not only can technology be hugely helpful for keeping in touch but is also invaluable to help people with visual impairments feel connected with the wider world through the internet and social networking.

My normal working days are Wednesdays and Thursdays. I run a drop-in service from our Outwood office on Thursdays between 10am and 12.30pm.
